Musings

Rabbi Ralph Mecklenburger



One is supposed to tell jokes for Purim, and, in particular, we poke fun at ourselves. But this is a pretty serious time for America and for Jews, with the Arab world and (as this is being written) especially Egypt—key to regional stability for decades—in dis-

array. Daniel Kurtzer, who served as U.S. ambassador to both Egypt and Israel, now of Princeton, gave an excellent briefing to Jewish leaders on the Egyptian unrest, noting the delicate line that our government had to walk between support of a long time ally, Hosni Mubarak, and support of freedom and democracy. Then one of the first questions was, “What will this mean for the Israeli-Palestinian Peace process?”

“That’s like the elephant and the Jewish problem,” he said, explaining that much though Jews and Israel have reason to be concerned, that is simply not what the whole crisis was about. *Does the new generation know that joke?*, I wondered. Perhaps, but the best jokes are old ones, and I had not taken my copy of *A Treasury of Jewish Folklore* (ed. Nathan Ausubel, 1948, p. 426) off the shelf in years!:

A professor of zoology at Harvard some years ago asked his graduate students, among whom were several foreigners, to write papers on the elephant.

A German student wrote: “An Introduction to the Bibliography for the Study of the Elephant.”

A French student wrote: “The Love-Life of the Elephant.”

An English student wrote: “Elephant Hunting.”

An American student wrote: “Breeding Bigger and Better Elephants.”

President's Message

The University of Chicago is known for its innovations in secondary education, its history of athletic prowess, its excellence in scientific research, and as the site of the first Latke-Hamantaschen Debate, in 1946. This debate has become an annual occurrence in Chicago and also at numerous other highly esteemed universities (and lots of not-so-highly-esteemed places as well). It has provided some of the most brilliant Jewish intellectuals the opportunity to attain heights of cerebral silliness that leave us in awe. A few examples: A former president of the University of Chicago, Hanna Gray, concludes, as a result of tortuous logic, that Machiavelli was Jewish and that since we know he was wise, he was, like all wise Jewish people, a latkephile. When he was president of Princeton University, Harold Shapiro pointed out the epicurean significance of the "edible triangle" in light of the literary "Oedipal triangle." Robert Silbey, dean of MIT's School of Science, claimed that latkes are the dark matter thought to make up over 21 percent of the mass of the universe. Allan Bloom, the noted philosopher and classicist, presented a conspiracy theory involving Sigmund Freud and the Manischewitz company. At Harvard, Alan Dershowitz claimed that latkes increased American dependence on oil. In opposition, cognitive scientist Steven Pinker proclaimed the latke to be linguistically superior, and morally superior as well, because of the hamantasch's use of the potentially hallucinogenic poppy.

These debates are very much in the spirit of parody and lightheartedness that are an essential part of Purim

celebrations. What other holiday has a Talmudic injunction to become inebriated?

The pastry in question, the hamantasch (singular), has an interesting, if not entirely well-documented, history. It is first mentioned in an eleventh-century Ashkenazic prayerbook. The word is thought to derive from the German and Yiddish "mohntasch," a pastry pocket (tasch) filled with poppyseeds (mohn). It was probably a small step for someone, at say, the Pinsk Kosher Biscuit Company, to realize that by adding a simple "ha" to the name of the cookie, they could market the product as the quintessential Purim treat. It also occurred to someone that the hamantasch resembled a three-cornered hat, which, surely, Haman must have worn. Others found a resemblance to an ear and, with apparently little compunction about consuming body parts of vanquished foes, proposed that hamantaschen (plural) represented Haman's ears, which is, in fact, what they are called in Israel (Oznei Haman).

Whether you see them as simply pastries or as pockets or hats or ears, there will be an ample supply of hamantaschen for your enjoyment at our congregational Purim celebration on Saturday night, March 19. Details are elsewhere in the Bulletin. See you there.

On Sunday March 6, Rabbi Dov Mandell, whom we very much enjoyed last year, will be back to address “What is Kabbalah?” Rabbi Mandell, a Hasidic rabbi, is director of Fort Worth’s Chabad House.

On Sunday, March 27, our local Jewish historian, Hollace Weiner, will address “The Decline of Jewish Women’s Groups.” Hollace’s latest book is *Jewish “Junior League”:* *The Rise and Demise of the Fort Worth Council of Jewish Women*. Sunday, March 6: Family Day—Exploring Israel

If you do not know your history, you do not have memories.

Every portion in the Torah connects to the land of Israel, and many prayers lead to Israel. We must learn to love our story. Knowing history is making the connection. Israel, like Torah and *mitzvah*, is a pillar of Judaism. Being engaged in various forms of Israel-related education and programming helps us to build a strong Jewish identity.

Every story has a beginning; the story of our people begins with the Torah in the land of Israel. Our connection to the land of Israel starts with Abraham and Sarah, when God promised that their descendants would inherit the land. Later, God repeats His promise to Isaac and Jacob. The promise was unconditional until God made it to Moses. He told Moses that the land would be for his descendants as long as they fulfill certain conditions or, in other words, “behaved.” After Egypt, we, the Jewish people, made it to the Promised Land, built the Holy Temple, and settled there for 400 years. According to the Biblical prophets, practicing idolatry caused us to lose the Holy Temple and to be sent into exile. But we received a second chance to go back

to the land, build the second Temple, and stay in the land for another 420 years.

Once again, according to the Talmud, we, the Jews, did not care for each other enough, so we were exiled again. But Jewish physical presence has been maintained unbroken throughout the centuries, even after the majority was forced into exile.

While in exile, we dreamed of returning to the land. We prayed and remembered the covenant with God and the promised land. After almost 2,000 years in exile and 4,000 years after Abraham, in 1948, Jewish people once again had sovereignty over a portion of the land of Israel. So, again, there is a place where Jews can live fully as Jews, if they so choose.

Each of our children is part of Am Yisrael, the world-wide community of Jewish People. Israel, in particular, is home to a large, vibrant Jewish community, and we want our students to feel connected to Israel and the Israeli people.

There was also a Jewish student in the class. He wrote: "The Elephant and the Jewish Problem."

There are scenarios in which Mubarak's fall could turn out to be very bad for Israel. Then again, who are we to preach that people should remain oppressed in Egypt?! (Oops—wrong holiday. Purim is about oppression in Iran. That's different!) The good news

is that there are scenarios in which change in Egypt, as well as other corrupt regimes that have diverted their people's attention from their own problems by blaming everything on the Jews, could turn out to be a good thing.

That is not a prediction. But Mordecai did outfox Haman. The serious message of Purim is, "Don't give up on the God of history!"
