Summer means graduations, vacations, and transitions; a time for endings and new beginnings. Per-

sonally, it is a time to say goodbye to the high school seniors who have grown up at Beth-El and are now ready to take the next steps outside our Temple walls.

I will miss them, but I know that I will be blessed to see their impact from a distance.

One of the great treats of my rabbinate is the opportunity to teach our 10th grade confirmation students. When they arrive for the first classes

in the fall, I am struck by how much they have grown since their Bar and Bat Mitzvah. They are older, but still unsure of their steps; more worldly, but also still kids. And with so many questions.

My focus on confirmation is about questions as much as answers. I ask our students to look at themselves, their families, and their own Jewish narratives in the context of the larger Jewish story, from the Bible until the present.

I challenge them to expand their Jewish identities and take nothing for granted.

We take a Shabbat field trip to Austin. We discuss God and afterlife. We struggle with the challenges of the modern state of Israel in our own role as American Jews. We visit the historic Hebrew Rest Temple Cemetery, and this year even sampled a kosher chili cook-off in Dallas.

At the close of our year together, there is a service of confirmation. Our students stand in the chapel underneath a Talit Chuppah while holding our Holocaust Torah Scroll. The students affirm their Jewish identity under a canopy of Torah built

by their parents and our Temple. Their stories and the story of our people's past converge.

These are challenging times. No one knows this better than our teenagers. And yet, my role gives me a unique window into the future. Perhaps

that is why I end the school year feeling so optimistic.

For all the world's challenges — and there are many — there are also reasons to be filled with hope. We are not simply stranded in the wilderness. We are always on the journey from Egypt to Israel. We are ending and beginning at the same time. And our children are ready. They are carrying our Torah into the future in their own unique and special way.

It is Abraham's response in Genesis, and it is Moses' response

in Exodus. It is, perhaps, most commonly translated as, "Here I am!" But, of course, it is believed to have a deeper meaning.



tells the story of a Jewish physicist's scientific pursuits and painful love affair, both of which unfold in a secret New Mexico town during World War





Then and Now: *Where are they now?*





One's a Supreme Court scholar; another's a Doctor of Divinity.

James F. "Jim" Simon, a member of Beth-El's Confirmation Class of '54, came from a

family of Yale-educated lawyers. Predictably he chose the same path. Aware that Yale had a Jewish quota in the 1950s, he worried about making the cut — especially since his best-and-brightest friend Sherwin Goldman (Beth-El '55) was also applying. Jim's cousin, Henry Simon (Beth-El '52), was already a sophomore

at Yale. When the lvy League school accepted both younger boys, "I wondered," Jim writes, "... if the two of us, plus Cousin Henry, had filled Yale's Jewish quota for Fort Worth for years to come."

Jim Simon ultimately became

dean of New York Law School as well as a Supreme Court scholar and author of 10 books. The latest, published May 13, is a memoir titled "Courting History: A Supreme Court Historian Reflects on his Life and Career."

Of local interest are his reflections of growing up Jewish in Fort Worth. His rabbi was Milton Rosenbaum, who made little impression on the boy. "I remember singing ... Ein Keloheinu with gusto, knowing that the benediction would follow, and I could go home," he writes. His most vivid memory was the confirmation class dinner at the Big Apple, a Jewish-owned barbecue restaurant that specialized in pork ribs — decidedly unkosher.

Jim's friend Sherwin urged him to get acquainted with Rosenbaum's successor,

Rabbi Bob Schur, "an outspoken advocate for civil rights" who marched with Black clergy to protest segregation in the city and beyond. The idealistic new rabbi became Jim's "close friend" and "mentor on Reform Judaism. ... I would raise the question of whether I could be a good Jew when I had serious doubts about the existence of God. The rabbi spoke ... with erudition about the Reform Jewish tradition and the ... ethical responsibility to serve the larger community. ... He assured me that I, too, could be a good Jew in the Reform

tradition by continuing to question my religious beliefs while engaging in the great issues of the day."

Jim Simon's latest book is on the shelf in the Temple library.

Daniel J. "Red" Goldstein, Beth-El Confirmation Class of '70, received a diploma from Paschal High, but a college diploma eluded him. Although he took classes at TCJC, TCU, SMU, UT Austin and the University of Phoenix, he never had enough credit hours, time, or money to finish. For 12 years he worked in the family business, Goldstein Brothers Jewelers, a downtown fixture since the 1890s. He hated it. Yet he developed strong customer relations as well as business and appraisal skills.

When he moved to Merrill Lynch in 1987, the brokerage firm invested in his education with corporate courses in advanced finances, but no diploma. Red was so successful he became a trust portfolio manager. In 2009, he and two colleagues opened Teak Tree Capital Management, LLC, specializing in financial planning and asset management.

Fifteen years ago, Red accepted an appointment to the Board of Visitors at TCU's Brite Divinity School. Three years later he advanced to the Board of Trust-

ees. He is the only Jew ever to sit on a seminary school board in the country, according to the Rev. Dr. Newell Williams, a historian of Christian history. In 2017, Red published a book, "Spirit Point: Balancing the Six Aspects of Life."

Red Goldstein concluded his Brite board service this spring, and at a ceremony May 10, the Rev. Dr. Stephen Cady, president of Brite, honored him with a black doctoral robe, a scarlet sash, also known as a hood, and an honorary Doctor of Divinity diploma.

The applause from the audience was loud, long, and enthusiastic.
