Hold that date, because that's when Beth-El will

host its second Interfaith Tikkun Leil Shavuot.

Last year, more than 100 members and religious leaders from Makom Shelanu Congregation, Broadway Baptist Church, University Christian Church, and South Hills Christian Church spent a night at Beth-El engaged in study, song, dialogue, art projects, and, of course, cheesecake.

Friends old and new, Christian and Jewish, chose from a variety of topics and activities, shared Shavuot treats, and considered their own religious journeys.

So, we are doing it again.

This year, we will also be joined by St. Luke's in the Meadow Episcopal Church and TCU's Brite Divinity School.

The custom of Tikkun Leil Shavuot, a

night of counting and waiting in anticipation of the giving of Torah at Mount Sinai, goes back to at least the 16th century and the Northern Israel community of Sefat. In anticipation of this pivotal Jewish moment, mystics stayed up all night preparing for and re-enacting the moment of revelation.

We may not stay up all night, but we will be at Temple from 7 p.m. until midnight. Please feel free to come and go as you please.

Once again, there will be many different presentations with music, visual artists, clergy conversations about the nature of revelation, social action discussions, and maybe even some cooking. And, did I mention, an ample supply of cheesecake?!

Though it actually means more, *tzedakah* is most commonly translated as charity, according to the URJ's website. "Jewish tradition teaches that giving *tzedakah* is a religious imperative," the website continues, "even for those who have little to give." Chabad's website informs that *tzedakah* may be in goods or services. Or something else. "Each of us has something to contribute: time, expertise, attention, or even a simple smile." Put another way you may have heard: "Time, talent, or treasure."

We experience these at Beth-El frequently. Congregants give their time. Michael Ross, a former congregation president, leads tours of our Temple and hosts guests who attend services. Mark Cooper mans the front desk on Sunday mornings and greets Shabbat service attendees. A team takes turns operating our streaming services.

Angie Friedman and Caroline Slotter, as well as volunteers in our choir, lend their voices and talents to infuse our events with a richness only music and song can. Those with special skills assist with matters involving real estate, construction, technology, baking... and, of course, we have some dynamos who are seemingly everywhere

doing everything for us.

Monetarily, many give — from a dollar or two via their children and Religious School each week to the outer bands of our Sanctuary Circles. Meg and John Rubin recently contributed generously toward a series of camperships so some of our students may attend Greene Family Camp at a reduced or no cost. There are many plaques and markers recognizing donors for their gifts.

Julie Goldstein again led our Fundraising Committee to a successfully completed campaign, this year celebrating Brian Zimmerman's 10 years as our rabbi. I hope you were among the many in attendance at the Annual Fundraiser. It was quite fun and raised money that is crucial to our organization — from basics like paying the "light bill" to supporting the numerous events advertised in this bulletin and emails you should be receiving.

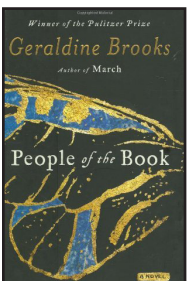

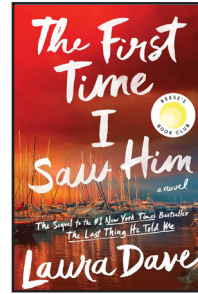
People of the Book

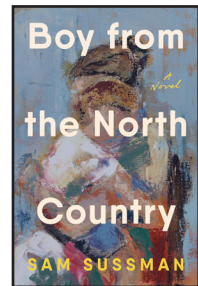

by Laura Dave

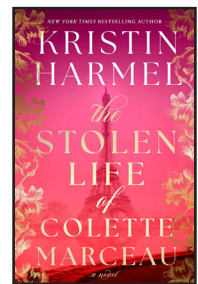
